

## We are the People of the Book.

For thousands of years, Jewish culture, traditions, and values have been shaped by an ongoing conversation with our texts and with one another. Sefaria is a nonprofit organization dedicated to creating the future of Torah in an open and participatory way.

Historically, developments in information technology have expanded access to Torah. From an oral tradition to handwritten scrolls to a vast corpus of printed books, each new medium democratized knowledge and brought more people into the great Jewish conversation. We are the generation charged with shepherding Torah from print to digital in a way that can expand its reach and impact in new and unprecedented ways.

# Thistory of Sefaria

## 2013

Co-founders Joshua Foer and Brett Lockspeiser **launch Sefaria**.

## 2015

Sefaria makes its **first deal with a major Jewish publisher** (Urim) to digitize and release translations into the public domain.

The Sefaria library grows to include **50 million words.** 

## **2017**

Sefaria makes history by releasing **The William Davidson Talmud.** 

Sefaria launches **sefaria.org.il**, a website for Israelis and native Hebrew speakers.

## 2019

Sefaria celebrates the release of **Nechama Leibowitz's** sourcesheet collection, marking the first female commentator in the core Sefaria library.

Users continue creating source sheets and the database hits **200,000!** 

Sefaria's library hits **209 million** words.

## 2014

Sefaria's engineers stretch the limits of what digital Torah can do by pioneering the **first data visualization tool** showcasing connections between Tanakh and Talmud.

Users create **6,000 source sheets** using Sefaria's Source Sheet Builder.

Sefaria launches its Day School Partnership Initiative with a **cohort of four schools.** 

## 2016

Sefaria releases a complete, bilingual version of Rashi's Torah commentary.

Sefaria puts the Torah in users' pockets with its first **mobile apps** for Android and iOS.

## 2018

More than **1 million users** from almost every country in the world visit Sefaria's library in a single year.

**Sefaria releases two digital dictionaries:** the Jastrow Talmudic dictionary and the Klein etymological dictionary of Hebrew.

## **LIBRARY**

Sefaria's library showcases the remarkable textual tradition of the People of the Book like never before. Sefaria's collection contains nearly 210 million words in Hebrew and English translation, spanning Tanakh, Midrash, Mishnah, Talmud, Halakhah, Responsa, Kabbalah, Chasidut, Philosophy, Musar, Liturgy, and commentaries.

## PRODUCT

Sefaria's library is designed for a seamless, beautiful, and intuitive learning experience. Our engineers work to develop explanatory tools and innovative resources that encourage exploration and allow users of all backgrounds to engage with the Torah in new and unprecedented ways, unique to the digital era.

## **EDUCATION**

Sefaria is not merely an archive for preserving Jewish texts; it is a platform meant to give these texts new life. Sefaria partners with Jewish schools, organizations, and thought leaders to develop innovative lesson plans, support educators and students, and explore the possibilities that emerge at the intersection of Tech and Torah.

## INFRASTRUCTURE

For the Jewish people, our texts are our collective inheritance. They belong to everyone and we want them to be available to everyone. As such, all of our code is released in the public domain or with free public licenses, ensuring that texts in the library are free to use and reuse, forever. Sefaria's easily exportable data powers Jewish learning across the web as we invite everyone – including third-party developers, researchers, and other digital publishers – to reuse our code and data to build apps, conduct research, make visualizations, and more.

## **ACCESS**

Access is at the core of everything we do at Sefaria. We believe that the People of the Book should enjoy unfettered access to their eponymous texts. It's what leads us to make the site free, release all texts with open licenses, build our product to be maximally intuitive for people of all ages and digital fluency, and offer visual aids and learning tools along the way.

## **CONVERSATION**

Judaism's core texts grew out of millennialong conversations and arguments across generations. More than a collection of books on a shelf, the Jewish canon is a giant corpus of interconnected texts that speak to each other. Sefaria is making it easier than ever to explore the conversations of the past, while also creating a space for ancient conversations to continue in new ways, with new participants, new questions, and new layers of dialogue.

#### PRODUCT DEVELOPMENT

Our engineering and design efforts this year were geared towards maximizing the accessibility of Sefaria's library by making text navigation easier and empowering users to discover, learn and create Torah.



#### PRODUCT SPOTLIGHT

#### The Two-Way Linker

A couple of years ago, we released a free JavaScript plugin that automatically connects Torah content across the internet to primary sources in our library. Websites that use this Sefaria Linker give their users direct access on their site to any primary sources they cite, allowing curious learners to go deeper in their study. This winter, we released a Two-Way Linker that now enables the reverse: citations on external websites that have embedded our linker will now appear in the Sefaria sidebar as a new resource to explore while learning. This small bit of code has disproportionate potential for Sefaria. It allows us to offer relevant contemporary Jewish content to our users without having to negotiate licenses and raise concomitant funds. More exciting yet, if successful, the Two-Way Linker has the potential to position Sefaria as the central node in the Torah internet. We're still in the early stages of connecting with outside sites but one day, we hope you'll be able to find all of your favorite Torah on Sefaria.

## **CONTENT ACQUISITION**

Our library grew from 184 million words to 209 million words this year, with special emphasis placed on rounding out our core collection and the acquisition of texts in translations.

#### In 2019 we added:

- The final three tractates of the William Davidson Talmud
- New translations: Avot d'Rabi Natan and the Mishnah
- New learning tools, including vowelization and punctuation for Talmud

#### **CONTENT SPOTLIGHT**

#### **Nechama Leibowitz Collection**

In May, we celebrated the historic release of 1,500 of famed scholar Nechama Leibowitz's source sheets. Nechama Leibowitz, z"l, was one of the towering figures of Torah scholarship in the 20th century and the founder of the modern source sheet. Her students were so eager to study with her that they often asked for homework, and these assignments developed into her legendary gilyonot or source sheets. These gilyonot are studied for their incisive questions and thought-provoking approach, and we are thrilled to offer them on Sefaria. In addition to this being the first time this collection of work was made available to the public, this was also the first time Sefaria featured a woman in our list of core text commentators.

# Year in Review

#### **MARKETING**

For the first time in 2019, we invested in marketing Sefaria (instead of relying on organic growth alone) in an effort to grow the audience for Torah.

#### MARKETING SPOTLIGHT

#### Press

Sefaria was in the news in 2019! We received more press this year than ever before. Highlights included a story titled "Sefaria Turns a Female Page" in The Jerusalem Post celebrating the Nechama Leibowitz launch, and mentions in several interesting thought pieces (on topics like the consequences of a digital Torah on Jewish memory; Torah and Braille; and a piece on Torah and global Jewry titled: "How do you say Sefaria in French, German or Italian?"). Most exciting yet, Sefaria closed out the year – and the decade – with some pretty remarkable coverage. The Forward selected Brett, our co-founder and CTO, as one of their 50 most influential American Jews. The Jewish Week included Sefaria in their roundup of major Jewish stories of the past decade, and the JTA led with Sefaria in a list of the 10 ways American Jewish life changed in the 2010s.




#### **EDUCATION**

In 2019, our team traveled near and far to explore what a digital library of Torah texts could offer to students, teachers, and curious learners around the globe.

#### 2019 highlights include:

- Trainings in Uruguay, Buenos Aires, Rio de Janeiro, São Paulo, and Paris in partnership with Israel's Ministry of Diaspora
- The launch of Pedagogy on Sefaria, a new group for model lesson plans using Sefaria
- Our new training courses for educators and students
- Partnering with the Be'eri Initiative for Pluralistic Jewish Education in Israel to empower Jewish educators in secular schools



#### **EDUCATION SPOTLIGHT**

#### **Baltimore Regional Intensive**

Our team piloted a new educational intensive in Baltimore. Generously funded by the Meyerhoff Foundation, our Director of Education Sara Wolkenfeld made the first of three visits to Baltimore in November to work with the entire community to explore how Sefaria might superpower Jewish learning at every level. The first visit was wonderful, the highlight being Sara's presentation – titled Torah Learning in a Digital Age – at the CJE's Festival of Jewish Literature, in which every participant worked with a group of their peers to create their own sheet on Sefaria. You can view the entire group of sheets on Sefaria. We look forward to continuing this work over the next two visits.



# Year in Review

#### **FUNDRAISING**

Continuing to strengthen our community fundraising efforts was of chief importance to us in 2019. We sought to build a more sustainable model by encouraging our users to give through a variety of different channels.

#### The results were remarkable and we:

- Increased our overall donor base by 40% from 2018 to 2019
- Increased the total amount raised under or equal to \$1,000 by 67%
- Reached 230 participants to join Sefaria Sustainers, Sefaria's monthly giving program
- Had 56 people sponsor a day of learning on our site
- Secured \$136,000 towards new text sponsorships from eight individuals and foundations

#### **FUNDRAISING SPOTLIGHT**

#### **Foundation Support**

Foundation support remains vital as we continue to build out these more sustainable fundraising channels, and we continued to experience the generosity and loyalty of our most trusted partners this year. At the end of 2018 and beginning of 2019, Sefaria secured major renewal gifts from the Maimonides Fund, Jim Joseph Foundation, and William Davidson Foundation. More than material support, this vote of confidence from Sefaria's three major supporters laid the groundwork for much of the critical work described above as well as strengthened our appeals to new foundations whose support we sought this year. We secured new gifts this year from The Russell Berrie Foundation, The David Berg Foundation, Joseph & Harvey Meyerhoff Family Charitable Funds, Lippman Kanfer Foundation for Living Torah, and Leading Edge.






